Hay History Group

Following a very successful History Day in September Hay History Group is publishing its first Transactions which will record the research which has been undertaken by the group in the past 12 months. The theme for the History Day was "National Treasures of the Independent Kingdom of Hay" and the display content will be included in the Transactions.

Hay Castle

Hay Castle restoration has been developing at a rapid pace. The ancient gates have overlooked the town for many hundreds of years, although in recent years they have lain hidden behind fencing, overgrown vegetation and a large timber prop. One of the key elements of the project to restore Hay Castle involves the conservation of these impressive gates. Recent research has shown that one side probably dates to around 1640 (around the time the mansion was built), while the other may date to the mid 1300s.



Back in September each nine foot, oak door was carefully packed and padded, then lifted from its pintles using a small crane. The gates were then transported to the workshop of conservators John Nethercott & Company in Discoed near Presteigne.



The scaffolding surrounding Hay Castle is the biggest structure ever built in Hay-on-Wye, soaring 22 meters high. It comprises over 90,000 metres of galvanised steel tube. The most challenging part of this job, says **Network Scaffolding commercial** manager Garyn Lucas, is that it cannot be tied to the Scheduled Ancient Monument and Grade 1 listed building at any point. The scaffolding is built entirely freestanding to provide support to act against the lateral forces without tying into the building. The impressive structure will support a temporary roof over the mansion to enable construction of a new roof and insertion of steel support beams and the bronze clad staircase. The scaffolding is wrapped in a mono flex film which is like a huge tarpaulin, and will be in place until late 2019.

Y Gaer: a partnership project

As I hope most readers of Hanes know, y Gaer is the name for the inspirational development in Brecon which is bringing together the classical Shire Hall, which contains the Brecknock Museum & Art Gallery, with a new Brecon Library. Although there have been some delays, the fitting out of the interior is now proceeding and a 'soft' opening is expected quite early in the New Year — with a formal opening later on.

Volunteering

From its inception, Y Gaer has been a partnership project between Powys County Council and local community organisations and this partnership is further expressed through the role that volunteers are playing and will play in working for its success.

Y Gaer volunteers can choose to work either by welcoming and assisting visitors or by operating behind the scenes (for example playing a part in the management of the Collections). To provide information on this there will be a number of events, the first of which is an information evening on Tuesday November 6th (6.00 to 7.30 pm) at the existing Brecon Library. The event is organised by Powys CC and supported by the various local partners: the Brecknock Society & Museum Friends (BS&MF), the Brecknock Art Trust etc. Do come along if you can. Separately from y Gaer Volunteers, the BS&MF is building up a team of volunteers from across Breconshire for an 18-month Interpretation Project funded by the Garfield Weston Foundation. This team is charged with drawing together information on 200 plus exhibits to be covered by touchscreen tablet terminals that will add to visitors' experience in the renovated Museum and Art Gallery. Pop-up y Gaer: Library; Museum; Art Gallery

Y Gaer, the exciting new development that brings together the new Brecon Library and the Brecknock Museum & Art Gallery in one integrated complex, will be opening its doors within a few months. Societies and other



Brecknock History Forum are promoting the project across Breconshire through a pop-up display that will be making an appearance at local shows and other events this summer and autumn. There will activities for children and opportunities to discover what y Gaer has to offer, including educational facilities, volunteering opportunities, interactive displays and much more.

Do look out for it!

Interpretation Project for Brecknock Museum & Art Gallery - Note for potential volunteers The Interpretation Project will provide 45 information terminals in the galleries of the refurbished Brecknock Museum & Art Gallery in y Gaer. Each terminal will be equipped with a tablet computer at which visitors will be able to find information about key exhibits in its vicinity. The aim of these is to 'enhance the visitor experience' by adding both interest and depth to the limited information that can be provided on the regular printed label for each exhibit. Each tablet computer will be uploaded with interpreted material also provided through the Project.

The Interpretation Project is additional to the y Gaer Project itself. The Brecknock Society and Museum Friends (BS&MF), as one of the local partners to Powys County Council (PCC) on y Gaer (Breconshire's new cultural hub), is leading on the Interpretation Project. As a registered charity, BS&MF has been able to obtain funding for this project which would not otherwise have been available. BS&MF officers are working with PCC's museum staff and the Brecknock Art Trust in a project team to manage the Information Project.

The tablet computers and their mountings together with specialist IT and design services for the tablet displays are being funded through a grant to the BS&MF from the Garfield Weston Foundation.

The BS&MF is recruiting a team of local Breconshire volunteers to assist with researching and assembling the information to be displayed on the terminals.

The Volunteer Task

Volunteers on the Interpretation Project are asked to research and assemble information on one or more of the exhibits to be covered by the information terminals. The accompanying illustrated list gives some examples of the range of exhibits to be covered. Some volunteers will have some special expertise or will perhaps be knowledgeable about a particular part of Breconshire, others will simply like the idea of delving into the background of a person, painting or artefact! Volunteers will each have a mentor from the project team who will either allocate or help them choose particular exhibits to work on, and to whom they can turn for further guidance or feedback.

Volunteers will be expected to work largely from home and need to have access to a computer and the internet. They are asked to deliver a relatively simple initial layer of interpreted material on each of the exhibits to be covered by the information terminals in time for the opening of y Gaer in late February / early March 2019. They will go on to assemble additional layers of interpreted material, including carrying out any additional research. ('Interpreted material' includes photos,

('Interpreted material' includes photos, sound recordings and videos as well as text.) BS&MF will issue guidance and organise training workshops to help volunteers in planning their research and in obtaining and assembling information. The actual task of uploading the interpreted material onto the tablets will be done by others on the project team. The Interpretation

Project will finish at the end of March 2020.

All volunteers are asked to complete a registration form which includes terms and conditions, data protection etc. On finishing their task, volunteers are also asked to hand over and assign to the Museum an 'e-file' containing material from their researches for future use. An Information Project webpage is being developed where supporting information will be available about the Information Project. The Mostyn Psalter-Hours: a deluxe illuminated manuscript

Kathleen Doyle, Lead Curator of Illuminated Manuscripts at the British Library, will discuss their recent acquisition of the Mostyn Psalter-Hours, a deluxe illuminated manuscript made in London in the last decades of the thirteenth century. The book is an outstanding example of English illumination of the highest quality, and may have been made for a bishop of London.
