

Hay History Group Hay Castle Restoration



Since the white weatherproof covering was installed over the scaffolding structure, it has been very difficult to see what is going on underneath. Here's a short summary of the work that is being undertaken. In the mansion, floor boards have

been removed to install under floor heating and the walls and floors throughout have been taken back to the original stone. Drainage has been put in for the new kitchen, and the servants' staircase has been partially removed as it was found to be extremely rotten. It will be rebuilt and put back in the same position with damaged timbers replaced. In the derelict section of the mansion, the walls requiring repointing have been assessed and are being pointed with hot lime mortar. In the medieval tower, a Victorian-era wine cellar has been removed and wall areas damaged by this structure have been rebuilt using existing stone. On the first floor, the apartments have been stripped back and the stud walls are in place for the offices and public toilet facilities. Across the exterior of the entire structure areas requiring attention are being repointed.

All the stone roof tiles have been removed as have the felt and battens that lay beneath. Roofer Dilwyn Thomas found the roof structure in very good condition and currently the process of undertaking minor roof repairs is taking place. Once this is completed, the insulation will be put in and the stone tiles replaced. Once the roof is watertight again, the scaffolding roof cover can be removed in readiness for the insertion of supportive steels across the whole of the mansion.

In the mansion, floor boards have been removed to install under floor

heating and the walls and floors throughout have been taken back to the original stone. Drainage has been put in for the new kitchen, and the servants' staircase has been partially removed as it was found to be extremely rotten. It will be rebuilt and put back in the same position with damaged timbers replaced. In the derelict section of the mansion, the walls requiring repointing have been assessed and are being pointed with hot lime mortar. In the medieval tower, a Victorian-era wine cellar has been removed and wall areas damaged by this structure have been rebuilt using existing stone. On the first floor, the apartments have been stripped back and the stud walls are in place for the offices and public toilet facilities. Across the exterior of the entire structure areas requiring attention are being repointed.



Trenches for drainage and services gas, electricity and communications are being dug across the site by Brecon-based Seer Construction. Drainage has turned out to be one of the more troublesome elements of the project and has required high levels of discussion, planning and oversight. The rainwater that comes from the roof structures of the building all has to go somewhere in an efficient and ecologically sensitive manner. The old pipes were blocked and inadequate, and a new drainage system using a large soakaway has been integrated into the groundworks. At this time of year, all this digging has resulted in an amazing amount of mud. Archaeologist Peter Dorling has been on site whenever digging is taking place.

Interpretation Project for Brecknock Museum & Art Gallery

The Volunteer Task

Volunteers on the Interpretation
Project are asked to research and
assemble information on one or more
of the exhibits to be covered by the
information terminals. The
accompanying illustrated list gives
some examples of the range of
exhibits to be covered. Some
volunteers will have some special
expertise or will perhaps be
knowledgeable about a particular part

of Breconshire, others will simply like the idea of delving into the background of a person, painting or artefact! Volunteers will each have a mentor from the project team who will either allocate or help them choose particular exhibits to work on, and to whom they can turn for further guidance or feedback.

Volunteers will be expected to work largely from home and need to have access to a computer and the internet. They are asked to deliver a relatively simple initial layer of interpreted material on each of the exhibits to be covered by the information terminals in time for the opening of v Gaer in late February / early March 2019. They will go on to assemble additional layers of interpreted material, including carrying out any additional research. ('Interpreted material' includes photos, sound recordings and videos as well as text.) BS&MF will issue guidance and organise training workshops to help volunteers in planning their research and in obtaining and assembling information. The actual task of uploading the interpreted material onto the tablets will be done by others on the project team. The Interpretation Project will finish at the end of March 2020. All volunteers are asked to complete a registration form which includes terms and conditions, data protection etc. On finishing their task, volunteers are also asked to hand over and assign to the Museum an 'e-file' containing material from their researches for future use.
