Sacred Places – exploring the rich history of places of worship in the landscape of Breconshire

The first publication produced by members of Brecknock History Forum is now available.

There are 100 sites listed ranging from prehistoric stone circles through 'unimproved' Medieval churches to Victorian chapels. Celebrating Tretower Court and Castle



Nearly 100 years ago, the Brecknock Society saved the world-renowned Tretower Court from collapse, if not complete destruction. Recently, the Society has commemorated its achievement of raising funds to purchase the Court, after which it was handed it over to the government for a programme of repair and restoration.

public lecture, under the title 'A Pretty Castle and a Fair Place', by Dr David Robinson, who has himself had many years of close contact with both Tretower Court and Castle and who has written the current beautifullyillustrated guide-book. In the course of his lecture he traced the colourful histories of successive owners, the Picard, Herbert and Vaughan families. He also gave a lively account of the various eminent archaeologists, such as Cyril Fox and Ralegh Radford, who worked on site, and of their, often controversial, theories of conservation and reconstruction. There has been much debate over the origin and use of various main features of the Court - such as the north range with its long timber-framed balcony. It is dendrochronology (the dating of oak timbers from the width of their growth rings) that has provided much of the important recent evidence. Thus this has provided a firm midfifteenth century date for the west range with its Great Hall. This was the 24th Sir John Llovd Lecture, in a series which has become known as one of the premier public lectures in Wales. It was introduced by Dr John Gibbs, Chairman of the Brecknock Society, who referred to the fact that it was Sir John Lloyd, the first secretary of the Society, who had played a key role both in the initiative to save Tretower Court and in the founding and development of the Brecknock Museum & Art Gallery.

On the evening of Friday April 1st, a

After the lecture, Dr Robinson was thanked on behalf of all present by Mr Nigel Clubb and a retiring collection was taken for the educational work of the Society.

On the following morning, a group of Brecknock Society members was treated to a special tour of Tretower Court and Castle under the stimulating leadership of Dr Robinson, together with lively support provided Mr Ian Andrews, Lead Custodian, At the Castle, members were encouraged to identify details in the walls that indicated the various periods of construction, and in the Court to look at features such as the way in which the timber-framed balcony continues along only part of the west range. There were also discussions about the patterns of use of the large kitchen, and the 'pros and cons' of the current decoration and 'fitting out' of the Great Hall. From this first-hand experience, everyone gained new insights and understanding.

Josef Herman: refugee artist who made his home in Ystradgynlais

In response to the ongoing refugee crisis in the world and particularly the Ukraine invasion this year here is the story of Josef Herman who found a home in the warmth of the Ystradgynlais community for 11 years.

Artist Josef Herman (1911-2000) fled persecution in 1930s Europe before finding a haven in Ystradgynlais. He is renowned for sketches and paintings of real people, particularly Welsh miners, using a bold, distinctive style with simplified shapes and vivid colours.

The y Gaer museum art collection contains numerous works by Herman, including drawings, watercolours, and oil paintings.

Herman was born to a poor Jewish family in Warsaw in 1911. He left school aged 12, becoming an apprentice typesetter, then an artist. In 1938, aged 27, he fled Poland for Belgium due to mounting anti-Semitism, later moving to France and then to Glasgow in 1940. In 1942 he discovered his whole family had been killed by the Nazis in the Holocaust. He continued painting and in 1943 he held his first London exhibition, with L.S. Lowry.

Herman visited Ystradgynlais on holiday in 1944. He was later quoted as saying: "I stayed here because I found all I required. I arrived here a stranger for a fortnight; the fortnight became 11 years." Ystradgynlais provided a welcoming and inspiring home for Herman after six unsettled years moving across Europe. He put down roots and became part of the tight-knit local community, where he was known fondly as 'Joe Bach'.

In Ystradgynlais Herman was inspired by the people, by the strong sense of community in the town, and by a way of life that he respected and wanted to honour. Miners from nearby collieries became his subjects, shown as powerful, heavy-set men to reflect the dangers of their work. His style was bold and distinctive, involving strong shapes with minimal detail. His figures were monumental, conveying outer and inner strength.

Although frequently dark, his paintings contain a warm glow. Herman achieved this by underpainting with bright, light colour, before building up gradually with darker tones so that the picture radiates from within

One painting held in the Brecknock Museum collection is "Pen-y-Bont Inn", which shows in the background the Tawe Bridge. Herman had previously watched miners crossing this bridge against a glowing sky, a significant moment for him. "For a split second their heads appeared

against the full body of the sun, as against a yellow disc – the whole image was not unlike that of an icon depicting the saints with their haloes... The magnificence of the scene overwhelmed me."

By the 1950s Herman was a major figure in contemporary British art and his mural "Miners" featured prominently in the 1951 Festival of Britain. He said, "I think it is one of my key pictures and the most important one I did in Wales." In 1981 Herman was awarded an OBE for services to British Art and he was elected to the Royal Academy of Arts in 1990.

For 11 years he was part of a local valleys community, becoming a respected recorder of the Welsh mining communities of post-war Britain and illustrating an important part of our history."

New Acquisition

The subject is Thomas Thomas of High Meadow, Llangynidr (1827-1918), the image was taken at the Great Exhibition of 1851 at the Crystal Palace London. He attended the Baptist Sunday School in 1836 and learned arithmetic and to read and write. His family carried on living in the area found a few more generations with one branch moving

to Cardiff and on to America.



Volunteer Object of the Month

This month, Libby Rees has chosen the painting 'Brecon Cathedral' by Sam Garratt.

It's interesting, when doing a volunteer stint in the portico, to notice which exhibits attract most attention. The tray of moths and the fortune-telling machine are favourites. 'Lest we forget', the sinking of the Lusitania, always intrigues - visitors want to find out about the ship, the story of how it sank and why the painting came to be in Brecon. Not so many people look at another painting, now displayed between the portico doors and the staff room, but which used to hang above the desk.

It's an interior of Brecon Cathedral by Sam Garratt, painted in 1923. This

couldn't be more of a contrast to the tragedy and chaos of the Lusitania scene.

The artist has taken a symmetrical view down the nave, centred on the light of the east window. The composition is ordered by the regular verticals of the columns and windows and grounded by the repeated horizontal pattern made by the rows of pews. All is still, quiet, balanced, and peaceful. There's no action or




drama here to draw the visitor's eye, but the serenity is attractive, and it repays a second look.

Bore Llungwyn 23ain o fis Mai 1904 ydoedd pan fentrodd tri llanc o Blwyf Ystradgynlais, pen uchaf Cwm Tawe, i gerdded i bysgota ar Llyn-y-Fan Fach. Cymry Cymraeg oedd y tri, Lewis Davies, Ynys Uchaf. Ystradgynlais, yn 17 oed, David John Morgan y Bwllfa, Caerlan, yn 16 oed, a David James Gibbs o Abewgiedd, Cwmgïedd, yn 16 oed.

Saith milltir, ar ehediad brân, yw Llyn-y-Fan Fach o Gwmgiedd, ac ar fore'r Llungwyn gadawodd David James Gibbs ei gartref yn Abergïedd am chwech o'r gloch gan gerdded gyda'r gamlas nes cyfarfod â Lewis Davies ger Ynys Uchaf. Ymlaen wedyn nes cyrraedd gyda David John Morgan ger Gwesty'r Castell yng Nghaerlan ac ymlaen am fynydd y Garth a Chribart.

Wedi croesi'r mynydd fe aethant lawr hyd at Nant Ceiliog a'i chroesi cyn mynd ymhellach mewn i'r mynydd. Digon llwyddaidd oedd y tywydd yn ystod y bore, ac fe gwympodd glaw mân hwnt ag yma ar eu ffordd hyd at Fan Brycheiniog. Fe eisteddwyd yno am y tro cyntaf ers y bore, er fod eu bwyd wedi gwlychu gyda'r glaw mân. Ar ôl cerdded agos i dwy filltir ymhellach, fe ddaethant at Nant Sawdde y gwyddant oedd yn llifo o Llyn-y-Fan Fach.

Yno o'u blaen oedd dau ddyn o Gwmgïedd ac yr oeddynt yn eu hadnabod, Phillip Hopton, a Lewis Michael. (Tad-cu Arwel Michael, "Y King Fisher" galwyd ef lleol – oherwydd ei ddawn pysgota!)

Cynghorwyd y bechgyn fod y tywydd am waethygu ac iddynt ddechrau am adref ac anghofio am Ond bysgota. pysgota wnaethant, ac erbyn tri o'r gloch y prynhawn, pan eisteddodd y bechgyn i orffwys a thamaid i fwyta, fe sylweddolwyd oedd nad dvnion gweld Cwmgïedd i'w ac fe ddechreuant deimlo'n anesmwyth.

Dyna ddiwedd ar y pysgota ac fe ddechreuant ar eu ffordd adref, ffordd serth a hir hyd at Bwa'r Llyn, a saith milltir caled oddi yno tros y Mynydd Du am adref. Wedi cyrraedd Bwa'r Llyn, gwelwyd fod y niwl yn cau o'u hamgylch, ac roeddynt yn meddwl eu bod yn agos i darddiadau tair afon sef y Twrch, Gwys, a'r Gïedd, cwteri bychain ar lethrau uchaf y Bannau. Roeddent wedi gwlychu at y croen a'r niwl yn gwaethygu ac yn cau o'i amgylch. Ymlaen a hwy, yn ddigyfeiriad, ar goll mewn cell o niwl, oer, digyfaddawd. Y Mynydd Du.

Fe ddaethant at nant oedd yn llifo'n gyflym, fe neidiodd David James Gibbs trosti. gan gerdded ymlaen meddwl fod ei gyfeillion yn dilyn. Cafodd fraw pan edrychodd tu ôl a sylwi nad oedd ei gyfeillion i'w gweld yn unman. Gwaeddodd a chwibanodd yn ofer, ac fe benderfynodd gerdded vmlaen gan obeithio ei fod vn anelu Gwmtwrch. Ni fedrwn am ddychmygu beth oedd yn mynd trwy feddwl crwt un ar bymtheg oed ym moelydd creulon, anghysbell Mynydd Du.

Wedi gwlychu at ei groen, a gyda milltiroedd ar ôl eto cyn cyrraedd ei gartrefyn Abergïedd, gofynnodd iddo'i hun os oedd wedi cerdded mewn cylch diarwybod? Ym mha le oedd y llwybr fe ddaethant arno yn y bore? Roedd vn sicr ei fod wedi croesi ef vn ddiarwybod yn y niwl. Yn sydyn dyma afon o'i flaen, fe ddilynodd ef am agos i ganllath yn erbyn y llif dŵr, cyn sylweddoli ei fod yn gwneud y peth anghywir, ac fe drodd yn ôl gyda'r llif. Fe gadwodd gyda'r afon wedyn rhag ofn iddo golli ei ffordd unwaith yn rhagor, gan obeithio am Gwmtwrch yr oedd yn anelu.

Llifodd yr afon yn serth dros Sgydau (Rhaeadrau) hwnt ag yma, ac araf

oedd siwrnau David lawr trwy'r geunant wyllt. Wrth agosâu at wely'r cwm fe welodd nad Cwmtwrch oedd ef wedi gyrraedd, ond Glyntawe, ardal lle bu'n hel cnau yn y gorffenol. Bron llefain mewn gollyngdod, sylweddolodd mai Afon Haffes a'i achubodd o'r mynydd. Fe gerddodd yn agos i Bum milldir ers colli ei gyfeillion.

Adroddodd ei brofiad erchyll i'r Ffermwr a'i wraig yn Fferm Carreg Haffes a buont garedig iawn wrtho. Gofynwyd iddo aros yno tros nos yn y fferm, ond roedd eisisu mynd adref arno, rhag ofn bod ei gyfeillion wedi cyrraedd adref a'i rhieni gofidio amdano.

Erbyn iddo adael Carreg Haffes roedd yn chwech o'r gloch gyda bron i saith milltir eto cyn cyrraedd adref. Nid oedd gwasanaethau bysiau yr ardal hynny wrth gwrs, na chyfle i ffonio. Cerddodd heibio Castell Craigy-nos, ac erbyn iddo gyrraedd y gamlas ger Gwesty'r Castell Caerlan, ni ddaeth yw feddwl, ohewydd blinder, i alw heibio cartref Lewis Davies yn yr Ynys Uchaf.

Cafodd y bachgen bryd o ddafod gan ei rhiedi, ond fe newidiwyd eu hagwedd tuag ato pan sylwyd ar a cyflwr truenus yr oedd y bachgen ynddo. Gwnaeth ei fam swper iddo, ond methodd a'i fwyta. Fe ymolchodd ac aeth i'r gwely am noswaith anesmwyth Ddi-gwsg.

Yn agos i bedwar o'r gloch y bore

dyma dwrw curo ar y drws Abergïedd. Tad Lewis Davies, a thad David John Morgan oedd yno, yn gofyn os oedd David Gibbs wedi cyrraedd adref? Nid oedd son am eu bechgyn hwy, a 'doedd gan David Gibbs ddim syniad ble oedden nhw wedi eu gwahanu, na beth oedd wedi digwydd i'w gyfeillion.

Ar fore Mawrth y 24ain o Fai, pan ddeallwyd fod David John Morgan, a Lewis Davies heb gyrraedd adref o'r Mynydd Du, fe gauwyd gweithfeydd glo Abercraf ac Ystradgynlais i'r glowyr gael chwilio am y bechgyn. Bernir fod dros fil ag hanner yn chwilio'r mynydd mewn tywydd garw. Dywedodd un glowr eu bod llaw yn law, bron filltir o led yn chwilio am y bechgyn mewl tywydd ofnadwy.

Yn hwyrach yn ystod y dydd Mawrth, fe gyrhaeddodd Lewis Davies yntau, allan o'r mynydd ar ffin ogleddol fferm Y Ddorwen, sydd ar lethr gorllewinol Llwyncwnstabl, hynny oedd uwch Afon Twrch. Fe gwympodd wrth ochr y ffermdy gan fethu mynd ymhellach. Pan daeth Griffith Rees, y ffermwr, ar draws y bachgen anymwybodol, cludwyd ef i'r tŷ a'i ddodi yn y gwely.

Pan oedd yr achubwyr yn agos i amaethdy'r Ddorwen, galwyd hwy mewn, ac yno, er llawenydd iddynt, dyna lle'r oedd un o'r bechgyn, sef Lewis Davies. Dyna'r tro cyntaf i Griffidd Rees darganfod pwy oedd y bachgen yn ei gwely. Digon tebyg, oni bai am dynerwch, a gofal caredig ac amserol Griffith Rees a'i wraig, buasai Lewis Davied gorffen ei yrfa yno.

Yn y cyfamser darganfyddiad trist

wnaeth carfan arall achubwyr, sef Lewis Jones 0 fferm Caemawr Cwmgiedd, William Griffiths a'i frawd Tomos o fferm Penparc Cwmgiedd, a Williams Thomas O Fforchorllwyn Cwmgiedd, Roeddynt yn Nesàu at darddiad Afon Twrch, ar lethr Fan Brycheiniog. Fe ddaethant yno o hyd i gorff David John Morgan yn gorwedd ar wastad ei gefn gyda'i ddwy lygad yn agored. Yn ei logell roedd dau swllt wyth ceiniog a dimmai a phamffled bychan "Hanes Iesu" ac yn ei ymyl roedd basged fechan gyda brithyll ynddo.

Cyn hir aeth y newyddion trist ar led drwy'r ardal, ac fe welwyd tyrfaoedd yn ymgasglu ar lethr y Fan. Ar ôl codi math o elor wely, gwelwyd yr orymdaith yn cychwyn i'w gartref yn agos i chwe milltir i ffwrdd. Wedi cyrraedd at lan Afon Gïedd, fe ddewiwyd cant o ddynion i gludo corff y bachgen adref i'r Bwllfa Caerlan.

David John Morgan oedd y ieuangaf o'r bechgyn ac fe'i claddwyd yn Mynwent Capel yr Annibynwyr Tŷ'n y Coed, Penycae, Tawe Uchaf. Ar ddydd Sadwrn 28ain Mai 1904.
